

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## SOCIETY ANNUAL MEETING A CELEBRATION OF SUCCESS!

We are happy to report that the Society kept up the tradition of delivering a fun Annual Meeting! This was the first time that the meeting was held at the Rosendale Community Center. Over seventy-five members and friends had a grand time.

The meeting opened with a report by the secretary which gave highlights of the past season. There were educational programs galore which featured Rosendale geology, water monitoring workshops which made use of the Tan House Brook and many visitors to the museum. Outreach included a special exhibit on the history of tourism installed by the Society in the lobby of the Ulster County office building in Kingston.

There are two things that draw a crowd: good food and good "junk"! The Society offered both of these ingredients with two successful fundraisers last summer: The Old Fashioned Ice Cream Social and the Treasure Bazaar Sale at the Rosendale Street Fest.

Bringing great applause was the announcement of a grant through the office of State Senator John Bonacic for the urgently needed new roof for the museum building. The funding will be administered through the New York Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation. A major celebration will be in order upon the completion of the project.






We have discovered another dealer in Rosendale Cement. The 1860s Edwin A. Smith & Bro. invoice shows that they offered American made cement (Rosendale) and imported cement (Roman) as well as other building materials. Both the Rosendale and the Roman were natural cements. It is possible that the Rosendale Cement sold by Smith & Bro. was manufactured by David Saylor [see *Natural News* Fall 2005 issue] in Coplay, Pa.

#### William Beard Wants More Rosendale Cement 1847 Letter Found

The Society recently purchased from Paul Bourke, a stamp dealer in Ashland, Mass, an interesting postal history item. The letter was sent just three weeks after the introduction





of the first United State postage stamps on July 1, 1847. Because the message and the address were all on one sheet of paper it is know as a SFL or stampless folded letter. Three generations of Peter C. LeFever's [b. Nov. 16, 1805, d. Aug. 8, 1891.] family were involved in the cement business. Peter's father, Cornelius LeFever, had leased to Hugh White in 1837 a lot of land near White's cement quarry and road to White's kilns. Peter's nephews, R & C.I. LeFever were to later become the owners of a cement works and after the closure of the cement works continued as dealers in cement on Main Street Rosendale. William Beard the writer of this letter requested LeFever to ship one load of cement per

week and to make the cement barrels tighter. William Beard was a paving contractor who was to have a major impact on the marshy shoreline of the Red Hook section of Brooklyn. Beard was connected with the filing in of Red Hook's marshlands and the construction of the Atlantic Basin in the 1840s. He also built wharves in the nearby Erie Basin. In 1864 he sold his property to the Erie Basin Dock Company.



*Ireland's Past and Present Leaders. Patriots and Martyrs* is wonderful publication chock full of Irish political history. It was printed in 1898 by Chaffee-McIndoe Co., in Providence, R.I. Of note are the advertisements in this publication. Hoffman Rosendale Cement and Alpha Portland Cement are offerd in an advertisement by Manchester & Hudson, a Providence masons' supply house. Manchester & Hudson are listed in the Directory of American Cement Industries (pg 413) under the classification of Cement Dealers. B.H. Hathaway [concreter & roofer, concreting walks, driveways, and cellars] is also mentioned in the 1901 Directory (pg 512) under a listing of contractors and large users of cement.

It is interesting to note the large number of masons and contractors that advertised in the patriotic publication. A partial list follows: Smith and Pool, Carpenters, Jobbers, and Stair Builders, all kinds of fitting up, located at 54 Friendship St.; M.L. Watson & Son, Contractors, Excavating, Grading & General Teaming, at 104 Mawney St.; Frederick E. Shaw, General Contractor, Sewers, Water Works, Foundations, etc., at 160 Atlantic Ave., corner Melrose St.;



Charles A. Vallie, Grocer, Contractor & Builder located in Cranston, RIO; The C.R. Blackmar Co., General Contractors, Sanitary Plumbing and Drain Laying, at 114 Elmwood Ave.; C.S. Pullen, Carpenter & Builder, at 366 New York, Ave.; John Deary, licensed Contractor, Sewers & House Drains, at 18 Pearl St.; William E. Waterman, Mason, Contractor & Builder, Brick, Stone & Wood Work, at Johnston, RI; John S. Clark, Jr., Mason and Builder, all kinds of Mason Work, at 8 Blundell St.; Wm. A. Lockwood, Mason & Contractor, all kinds of mason work' in Warwick, RI.

There are also of course the usual advertisements for pills and tonics that promise to cure all chronic complaints. Of special interest is a half page advertisement for snow guards. It appears that this type of snow guard was installed on portions of the roof of Century House at the Snyder Estate during renovations done in 1948.

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








This early view shows the southern face of Joppenbergh Mountain before cement rock mining had begun at that location.





### 1892 & 1904 Rosendale Maps

Bound volumes of the Sanborn maps for the Town of Rosendale for the year 1892 and 1904 have been added to the Society's archive. These two volumes were originally purchased by Girard L. McEntee, brother of Jervis McEntee renowned painter, son of James S. McEntee, civil engineer who helped build the Delaware and Hudson canal.

Each page of the Sanborn map has very detailed full color maps of the various Rosendale area cement works as well the street maps of the village area of Rosendale and High Falls. Because the maps were updated every six to seven years they help document the growth and ultimate decline of the Rosendale natural cement industry.

- \*12. D.A. Barnhart High Falls Cement Co. at High Falls. Closed
- \*13. Bruceville Cement Works, J.H. Vandermarks. **Not in operation**.
- \*14. New York Cement Co. at LeFever Falls or Rock Lock, **Not in operation and vacant**.
- \*15. Lawrence Cement Co. Rock Lock Mill at LeFever Falls. Not in operation. and vacant.
- \*16. Consolidated Rosendale Cement Co. Former Lawrence Cement Co at Binnewater. Operating.

### Field Trip to the Birthplace of American Natural Cement

The Third American Natural Cement Conference is to be held in Syracuse this September. It is in the vicinity of Syracuse along the original route of the Eire canal (the canal has been moved northward to Oneida Lake) that Canvass White discovered the proper limestone suitable for making hydraulic cement.

The published history of this event has different versions of who the discovers were, what they did, and even to where the discovery was made with several localities making the claim that the discovery was made on nearby farm.

Winter this year seemed to not want to arrive, so Ken Uracius and I thought that a trip to the Syracuse area should be made to see if we could find traces of the mines, quarries, kilns and possible other remains of this industry.

We knew that Canvass White and his younger brother Hugh White manufactured cement near Chittenango, Madison county, for at least ten years, possibly for as long as fifteen years. We know that Canvass supplied cement for construction of locks, aqueducts, etc., starting in 1819 and continued to specify his cement to just before his death in 1835.

Ken is from Massachusetts, settled in 1620, I am from the Mid Hudson Valley of New York settled shortly after Henry Hudson's discovery of the river which bears his name in 1609. We were now exploring the early history of towns which had just been settled at the beginning of the nineteenth century.

We had planned our trip so that we would arrive in time for the opening of the local libraries and historical societies. We had visions of finding the mother lode of local history relating to the natural ce-

ment industry. I had the feeling that if I stopped any passerby on the sidewalk and asked about Canvass White or natural cement that there would be instant recognition of White's name and directions to the location of his cement works. Well that didn't happen. Natural Cement? Portland Cement? Canvass White? Not a topic that rang any bells. We did quickly learn the author of the Wizard of Oz was born in Chittenango and that the Fayetteville library is housed in the former Stickley furniture factory. The librarians and staff at the local historical societies were very helpful in giving us access to the local history rooms and archives. At the Manlius Historical Society we found several ledgers and company records (approx. 1870s-1900) of James Behan, manufacturer of Manlius Brand Natural Hydraulic Cement. That was a wonderful discovery which I hope to be able to revisit another time.

Since we were not having the best of luck finding old documents we thought a search for the locations of some of these cement works would be in order. In Rosendale I have not as yet had to use a snow shovel this winter. Lake effect. I had never really given that term any thought. But now I know what it means. Temperature in Albany was 40 degrees and sunny. As we got near Syracuse the temperature was not all that much colder but snow, I mean snow like I have never seen snow. Every time we would stop to take a look at a rock outcrop for cement rock it was whiteout time. Even finding the falls at Chittenango was a challenge. Good thing we left when we did as the news reports that there is near ten feet of snow in some areas. But I am sure that we will be back after the snow melts in the spring. [dew]





Thanks to Gabriel Constantine who gave the Society permission to scan his collection of 124 photos taken between 1909 and 1923 in the Creek Locks area of Rosendale. Creek Locks (once known as Wagendall)

was one of the earliest settled areas of Rosendale. The photos show the continued use of the former D&H canal by the Consolidated Rosendale Cement Co. The photos are all on a CD and available for study at the Society's ever growing collection of photographic images of the Rosendale cement region. We are also working on scanning a large selection of photographs and documents provided to the Society by Richard Ross.


